DISCUSSION GUIDE

- 1. Read Malachi 3:6-12. What strikes you about this passage?
- 2. Some have read passages like Malachi 3:6-12 as being about how to prosper. For example, if I give God some money, then he will bless me. How would you argue for or against this idea?
- 3. Malachi talks about robbing God. Have you ever felt like you were robbing God?
- 4. Jesus talks about money as a key discipleship issue. Read Matthew 6:19-24. What are the hardest parts of Jesus' teaching here for you to fully live out?
- 5. "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Matthew 6:21 We follow what captivates our heart. What helps you follow Jesus well when it comes to your money?
- 6. Read 1 Timothy 6:10. Is it possible to have a lot of money while not loving money?
- 7. What's one area in your life where you struggle to let go of control over money or possessions?

PRAYER EXERCISE

- 1. Have everyone close their eyes and hold their hands palms-up on their lap as a symbol of openness to God.
- 2. Have someone lead the prayer time with these prompts:
 - "Picture something you're holding onto tightly-money, a possession, a worry about the future. Name it silently to God."
 - · "Imagine placing it into God's hands. Ask Him to take it and replace it with His peace."
 - Think of someone in need you could help. Ask God for courage to give generously this week."
 - "Thank God for His provision-past, present, or promised-and rest in His care."
- 3. End with these words: "Lord, we open our hands and hearts to You. Free us from greed, fill us with trust, and guide us to give as You do. Amen."
